

How to Choose a Jackson Square Reader



Choosing a Tarot Counselor, Palm Reader, or Psychic Advisor is a very personal matter, which needs careful consideration.

If you are like me, you would not want someone else to push you into choosing a particular reader, any more than you would want to be told who to love or what profession to choose. Advice can be useful, but not if it attempts to control your decision making process.

I would suggest you interview several readers whom you feel might be likely candidates. Find out what their specialties are. Ask them questions about their spiritual path, their experience, and get a feel about how well you like and trust them. Always remember, the decision is yours to make.

Some readers are pushy. They will try to fast-talk you into getting a reader from them. That is not a good sign. I call them carnival readers. Jackson Square is not a carnival midway. Most readers here are much higher quality than that.

I sure would never go to a pushy reader who tried to influence my decision about which reader I should go to.

City ordinances dictate that readers not call out to prospective clients, or name a set fee.

We all work by donation on Jackson Square. No reader is permitted to walk up to you to try and convince you to get a reading. That is called *collaring*, and is against the law.

The police are not stopping readers from collaring or setting prices these days, but I suspect if a number of people were to complain to the Eighth District police here in the French Quarter, that might change.

If you are collared or quoted a set fee, you might want to phone 504-658-6080 and report the name and description of the reader breaking the law.

Readers are permitted to tell you what they usually receive for a donation, as many people have no idea what a fair donation might be.



What you pay for a reading on Jackson Square does not determine the quality of your reading.

Find a reader you are comfortable with, and be honest and open about what you are seeking to get from the reading.
